PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Fellow FISH Volunteers:

In our November, 2022, newsletter, I mentioned that we were entering our busiest time of the year and asked that you continue to serve our clients with "patience, love and good cheer". I have to congratulate each one of you for exceeding my most optimistic projections. You were amazing, as you provided support to a near record number of individuals and families with food, clothing and housewares during this frenetic period.

As you know from your own experience, we started out modestly in January, 2022 (during renovations and our pending relocation) with 194 unique households comprising 528 unique individuals served. After our move was completed, those numbers increased rapidly month after month with December statistics reaching 441 households and 1,170 individuals!! These numbers, we believe, were the result of greater visibility on Second Street, but more importantly, of greater need caused by the lingering effects of the COVID pandemic and rising inflation that severely affected our client base.

The disturbing data on inflation, particularly on food prices, has created increasing hardship on our clients and makes our jobs that much more critical. Consider this: in 2022, overall food prices increased by 9.9%. Egg prices led the way, increasing by 32.2%, the result of Avian Flu. Poultry was up 14.6%, cereals up 13%, dairy products up 12% and on and on. The predictions for 2023 are essentially more of the same with egg prices predicted to increase by 27.3%. Other food prices are also expected to increase, although by smaller percentages. The only outliers in this data are projected decreases in beef, pork and fresh fruit prices by 1.7-3.0%. (All this data is from the USDA Research Service, 1/25/2023.)

Further compounding the problem is a supply chain that, while not broken, is certainly bent. We don't know, week to week, what our food orders will look like. Some weeks we can't get beef stew; other weeks we are shorted on bread or any number of non-perishable items. High prices or not, we continue to order eggs because of their high nutritional value. This Monday, we ordered 150 dozen eggs and received 45 dozen. We have tried to counteract these negative factors by ordering from alternate sources, although not always successfully. Following direction from our Board, we have determined that, effective immediately, we will "expand our footprint" vertically by significantly increasing the amount of food that we give our customers. Revised "Quantity Guidelines", dated January 23, are now in place to guide our pantry volunteers. Thanks to Maura Rush, Ginger Miller and Holly Trotter who led this initiative. We will closely track the impact of these increases over the next few months to determine their long-term efficacy.

2022 SERVICE HIGHLIGHTS

In 2022, FISH served 3,886 requests for assistance:

- 3,360 requests for food, equating to an estimated 188,265 meals
- Clothing for 6,912 outfits
- Housewares for 386 households

We served 1,325 unique households of which 492 were new to FISH (37%):

- City of Williamsburg: 474 households (35%) with 1,341 requests (35%)
- James City County: 610 households (46%) with 1,850 requests (48%)
- York County: 196 households (15%) with 592 requests (15%)
- Outside Service Area: 45 households (3%) with 101 requests (3%)

In addition, we distributed:

- 3,300 Food Lion gift cards, \$10 each
- Emergency groceries to residents of four local motels.

After we loaded the bags into her car, she used Google Translate to tell me that we had made her so happy by getting so many new clothes. It gave me such a nice feeling knowing that we made her so happy by helping her family.

We're currently watching a show on Netflix called Maid. It is giving me some awareness of the struggles of the working poor. It really reinforces my awareness and conviction of the good that FISH provides.

If you haven't considered escorting clients in the Clothes Closet, you may be missing out on experiencing a special aspect of our FISH mission. I was hesitant at first, but found out that it gave me a particular kind of joy to interact with a client while they select items for their family. Volunteer Spotlight

WHAT DO YOU NEED?

Jeanne Fulks Clothes Closet-Housewares

Q1. Why did you choose to volunteer at FISH?

A1. I moved to Williamsburg, in 2017, to be near my son after the death of my husband. I started volunteering with FISH in July, 2018, with the ladies from Mt. Vernon United Methodist Church sizing clothes one day a week for adults and, more specifically at that time, children. After the month was over, l liked It so much I asked the FISH coordinator, Billie Johnston, if she could use me every week. She said absolutely, and the rest is history. Billie was a huge influence on me, specifically when Covid first hit. I also volunteered in the Food Pantry several days per month, as well as the Mobile Food Pantry at Life Church once a month. Now I primarily work in the Clothes Closet-Housewares twice a week.



Q2. What do you find most rewarding about FISH?

A2. Helping folks with their clothing and houseware needs is very rewarding. Through incredible donations from our community, hotels, organizations, schools and families, we now have more linens, towels, plates, glasses, utensils, cookware, small kitchen appliances, coats, etc., than we've ever had. It's pretty amazing!

We ask our clients, "What do you need?", and some start out saying they feel ashamed of their situation. We ALWAYS try to make them feel that whatever they are going through is okay and could happen to anyone; and that we are extremely grateful to be able to help them in any way we can.

Q3. Do you have a specific experience while volunteering at FISH that you would like to share?

A3. My contribution to FISH, while working in Housewares, entails sorting, cleaning, and preparing items to be put in the Clothes Closet for our clients, making sure everything is in good shape. One day recently, we received a microwave oven, and I was just finishing cleaning and testing it to make sure it worked, when a client asked their volunteer if we had one. The client had recently been placed in one of the hotels and had no way to cook. Pretty amazing that we had exactly what she needed at that exact time! When you can improve someone's situation in any way, and see them leave happy and feeling better, it makes it all worthwhile.

Q4. Is there anything else you would like others to know about you?

A4. I love working with fellow volunteers and backing up each other when one of us is away—really incredible people!

I enjoy being near my son, and working church activities that benefit the church and the community.

And, then there is my cat, "Princess" Diana. Her name is Diana and I rescued her from a local shelter. My granddaughter told me about the "Princess" and talked me into adopting her 5 years ago. She really is living up to her name and rules the house.
