## Good News Flash:

The remediation contractor has completed the project, removed the temporary plastic wall and his equipment. We are now ready to re-open on Tuesday morning.

Background: For those of you who may not be aware of the situation, FISH experienced a plumbing/sewage problem on Wednesday afternoon, June 14. This affected the Food Pantry only with the backup, but it does appear that it might impact our overall plumbing facilities.


In an abundance of caution, we hired a remediation company to clean the affected area and remove all evident moisture. They also placed air scrubbers and dehumidifiers in the area.

Since the remediation happened so quickly, it has been confirmed that none of our food was damaged and all is safe for consumption.

With that in mind, we felt it best to close FISH on Thursday, Friday and Monday with plans to reopen on Tuesday morning, the 20th.

We are meeting with our plumber for estimates, and have begun preliminary conversations about our approach to our landlord with respect to the financial responsibility of this event.

Many thanks to Dan Fontaine and Joe Benedetti for their quick actions, and to Bob Stanzione, a new volunteer who recently agreed to be Building Manager, for taking the lead on the cleanup with the contractor, and reporting to the Board. Thanks to all who jumped in to help!
