#### WHAT'S HAPPENING AT FISH?

Welcome to 2024!

We are certainly busier than we have ever been before, both in the Food Pantry, as well as the Clothes Closet. Many volunteers are working hard to stock shelves and refrigerators, find the right size of pants, and refill the clothes rack outside the Pantry several times a day.

Our 2023 statistics show that FISH served 367,311 meals, and well over 12,000 outfits of clothing. The number of people served, whether food and/or clothing, was equivalent to 18,000 people.

Looking towards the future, 2025 will be FISH's 50th Anniversary in Williamsburg! That is definitely something to be proud of! If you are interested in working on a committee to celebrate this, please let me know.

We are definitely moving upward and forward. We have several new ideas from our volunteers, like the Adopt-a-Shelf Program, an easy way to make sure we have a supply of a specific food item for our clients. There are several Spanish-speaking volunteers in the Clothes Closet who are also willing to translate in the Pantry, as needed. We also have forms translated in Ukrainian and Farsi. If you speak a different language, please advise, as we might need to call upon you to help.

#### Helping a Non-English-Speaking Client

As our client base grows, we seem to be getting an ever-increasing number of non-English-speaking clients. In an effort to ease communication, I have been learning Spanish for some time using the free Duolingo app. While I cannot converse in Spanish, I know basic words related to clothing, and also use the Apple Translate app. Recently, I had my greatest challenge. An Hispanic mother with a family of four was at Registration. I understood that she wanted to get some clothes. Between the Spanish that I've learned and using the Apple Translate app, we communicated adequately to help her quickly select the clothing and housewares that her family needed.

I had another experience recently with a Pakistani mother that spoke Pashto and only knew a few, very basic English words like yes and one, two, or three. In this case, I was able to communicate using hand gestures and the Pashto translator in Google Translate.

Both clients seemed to leave happy and thanked me for taking the extra effort. It also made me happy to feel that they had a good FISH experience.


#### William "Bill" Dickerson

#### Q1. Why did you choose to volunteer at FISH?

A1. After moving to Williamsburg from Chesapeake last year, I was looking for a volunteer opportunity that would allow me to have a direct impact on the Williamsburg community. I had driven by FISH and decided to call and ask if there were any open volunteer positions. I was later contacted by Martha Buell who invited me to tour.

While touring I was immediately impressed by the organization of the facility and the number of volunteers working. Each volunteer welcomed me to FISH with open arms and all were excited to have me join as part of the team. After seeing how friendly and hardworking all of the volunteers were, I knew I had chosen a great organization to join to make a difference within the community.



#### Q2. What do you find most rewarding about volunteering at FISH?

A2. The gratitude that we receive when we bring out the orders to the clients is always a great reminder that our work is making a difference to those in need within our community. I enjoy meeting the people that come to FISH and I hope that I can help make their day a little bit brighter from our interaction.

Additionally, every time I work at FISH I'm inspired by the other volunteers who have been a part of the organization for years. Having the opportunity to work and connect with people who also have a genuine desire to serve others is always empowering.

#### Q3. Do you have a specific experience while volunteering at FISH that you would like to share?

A3. While volunteering, I met a woman who was a client at FISH years ago but this time was returning to bring in donations for the Clothes Closet. She expressed to me the gratitude that she has for FISH after we helped her during a financially difficult time. She told me that she is happy to now be in a position where she can return the help to FISH and other members of the community with her donations.

#### Q4. Is there anything else you would like others to know about you?

A4. I first began volunteering while in high school at a dog rescue in Norfolk. (My parents and I actually adopted one of the dogs from the rescue and we still have him today!) I continued to volunteer throughout college, and following graduation, I discovered FISH when I moved to Williamsburg.

I'm originally from Chesapeake and have only lived outside of Hampton Roads while attending college at Virginia Tech. I moved to this area to live with my best friend who attends William & Mary Law School while I was completing my Master's online through VCOM (Edward Via College of Osteopathic Medicine). I completed my Master's in Biomedical Sciences this past June, and I hope to begin medical school this summer to start my journey toward becoming an emergency medicine or family medicine physician.
