PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

FISH has so many wonderful teams that are an integral part of our day-to-day happenings. Let me tell you about a few.

Every Monday morning, several teams jump into action. The Dollar Tree Team (Jan Gibeling, Bob Voigt and John Ellis) orders items from Dollar Tree, picks up our order and delivers to FISH early.

After the Dollar Tree Team finishes its work, the **Monday Morning Team** meets at the Food Lion on Richmond Road, picks up our order in the FISH van, and delivers it to FISH. This team consists of Dan Fontaine, Jeff Bennett, Bob Delo, Camden Masuoka, Ford Mosely, Jim Nebgen, Mark Prosser, Bob Stanzione, Jack Trotter, Steve White, Dick Young and Tony Zotto, who work in rain, drizzle and this heat to deliver 180 dozen eggs, 120 loaves of sandwich bread, and many cases of necessary foods.

Once the cases of food are inside the building, the Shelving Team takes over and finds space on the food shelves, and in our refrigerators and freezers. This group is led by Holly Trotter and Maura Rush, and includes Jan Gibeling, Dale Huebner, Lindsay Lilly, Ruth Bott and Marci Kaplan-Lips.

Monday is also the day the Olive Garden Team goes to the restaurant and picks up frozen items such as alfredo sauce, lasagna, etc. This is Maura Rush, Holly Trotter and me.

There is also the **Foodbank Shoppers Team** who visit the Virginia Peninsula Foodbank. This team is highlighted on page 3 of the newsletter. Awesome goal met!

On the third Tuesday of every month, the Diaper Bank Team--Martha and Bill Dean--drive to Chesapeake to the Greater Hampton Roads Diaper Bank and collect our monthly order of diapers. The Deans also collect the diapers for Grove Christian Outreach Center and deliver their supply to them--another great example of teamwork with another nonprofit!

FISH also has a Thank You Letter Team with Cathey Sadowski, Ronda Roberts and Mary Ann Brown who prepare and send thank you notes, cards, or emails. We are looking to expand this group, so if you are interested in helping, please see Cathey, Maura or me.

A huge THANK YOU to every team member. FISH could not exist without your constant help and support.

Another Way to Donate to FISH -- RMD

If you are in the age group where it is mandated that you take a **Required Minimum Distribution** (RMD) from your IRA or 401(k), you need to do this annually by December 31.

This amount can go to a non-profit organization and does not count as taxable income to you, but this does count towards your RMD distribution. It is not considered income for tax purposes.

Continuing Ling's Legacy


The Knights of Columbus from <u>Saint Bede Catholic Church</u> recently conducted a tremendously successful food drive to benefit FISH.


