# Cindy Tocci Director, Clothing Co-Coordinator

#### Q1. Why did you choose to volunteer at FISH?

A1. When I retired and moved from New Jersey, I donated a lot of my clothes and housewares to FISH. Every time I brought items, I was greeted by a friendly volunteer and saw how pleased the clients were when they left with their food and clothing. I wanted to volunteer and was searching for an organization that embodied its mission. I was ecstatic to find FISH.

#### Q2. What do you find most rewarding about volunteering at FISH?

A2. The strong sense of community that exists among the volunteers and between the volunteers and clients. All the volunteers are friendly, dedicated, and have common values about helping others. It's a pleasure and honor to work with them. I also enjoy guiding clients through their shopping experience in the Clothes Closet because I get to learn a little about them and apply that information to help them select items and put outfits together. A few times the clients wore clothes they selected in a previous visit or from our free racks. It's satisfying to hear how grateful clients are and that our services have a positive impact on their lives. Volunteering at FISH has enhanced my move to this area.

#### Q3. Do you have a specific experience while volunteering at FISH that you would like to share?

A3. I've experienced greeting donors bringing items to the Clothes Closet and expressing their appreciation for what FISH does for the community. In a few instances, the donors were extremely grateful as they explained that they were helped by FISH in the past and it made a difference in their lives. They were at a point where they could pay it forward.

#### Q4. Is there anything else you would like others to know about you?

A4. I enjoy gardening and learning about plants that thrive in this area's conditions. I've lived in 6 states, each with different growing conditions, and many plants have suffered from my lack of knowledge. In addition to living in MA, TX, GA, CA, NJ and VA, I have toured every state except ND. I'm planning that trip.

I'm a bonus mom to 5 adult children, their spouses, and 4 grandchildren who live in NJ, FL, NC and VA. My brothers and extended family members live in MA, where I grew up. We enjoy visiting them or having them visit us.

I'm on the Board of Wild Tails, a North Carolina non-profit, educational exotic animal rescue. My knowledge of animals is limited, but I do provide guidance on the contents of the educational programs, so they are engaging and meet academic standards.

As a former middle-school mathematics teacher and educational researcher, I know how important proper nutrition and well-fitting clothing are to a child's development and learning. I'm so pleased to be able to contribute to an organization that assists children. It is something that will have huge returns in their future.
