FISH is very blessed!



VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

Patti MacGillivray Director & Clothes Closet Co-Coordinator



Patti headed the Clothing Closet starting in 2022, after the relocation. As Director and Co-Coordinator, she is responsible (with Cindy Tocci) for training and scheduling Clothing volunteers, as well as purchasing necessary clothing items and dealing with the many donations that come in on a daily basis.

Q1. Why did you choose to volunteer at FISH?

A1. When I retired from the health insurance industry, I was looking for a project or organization to support. I had tried two other organizations but wanted a more hands-on opportunity rather than fundraising or administrative work. I've always volunteered, starting with Girl Scout projects, Candy Stripers, and Get Out the Vote drives.

After seeing an article in the paper, I called FISH and left my name. Several days later, Billie Johnston called and invited me to join them on Mondays.

Q2. What do you find most rewarding about volunteering at FISH?

A2. I like the problem-solving aspect of working in the Clothes Closet. Every single day we face the challenge of keeping enough inventory for our clients versus our limited storage space. Our clients often present unique challenges in sizes and the need for specific clothing for jobs. I'm always glad to provide clients with work boots, sneakers, or scrubs for a new job.

Q3. Do you have a specific experience while volunteering at FISH that you would like to share?

A3. One summer afternoon I helped a young woman who had received a full scholarship to Norfolk State and whose grandmother had sent her to FISH for clothes. Since she was my granddaughter's age, I had fun helping her find the right jeans and tops, sneakers and a handbag like her dormmates would have. Then we found PJs, slippers and a hooded robe for nights studying in the dorm, plus a suitcase to carry it all with her. I hope it made her transition to school a bit easier.

Q4. Is there anything else you would like others to know about you?

A4. I'm a native Virginian, born in Lynchburg, with stops in Western Georgia, and Richmond before settling in Williamsburg in my husband's parents' home in 2000. My husband, Rod, is retired from Ft. Monroe and Langley AFB. We have a daughter, Meg, and her husband, Steve, and granddaughter, Bella.
