Heartwarming Experiences

Jeanne Fulks and I had a couple of recent Clothes Closet experiences that gave us an inner feeling of joy.

Jeanne is the team lead on Wednesdays in the Clothes Closet. Although we stop accepting clients in the Clothes Closet at 3:00 p.m., a client arrived a little after that and requested some housewares. She had previously been homeless and had just gotten an apartment. She originally asked only for a crockpot. When she came into the Clothes Closet, Jeanne showed her the crockpot that and asked if she needed anything else. She was so happy with the crockpot that she had tears in her eyes. She said she could use linens and other kitchen items but didn't realize she could have them. She left with bed linens, towels, kitchen dishware and utensils, and some microwave cooking dishes.

As we had been 6 volunteers short due to illness and vacations, seeing her appreciation and helping her get established in her new apartment made for a happy ending to a very exhausting day.

The second experience was with a client that had come to FISH for food in the past but was a first-time visitor to the Clothes Closet. She didn't know what to expect and was a little nervous. She was selecting clothes for herself, her husband, and three children ages 3 and under. The youngest was a 6-month-old girl. I made sure that she felt welcome and comfortable. She knew their sizes and quickly selected the clothing items for her family. She continually expressed her appreciation for FISH helping her family, and told her husband how great her Clothes Closet experience was. She was a true joy to help. Seeing her so happy warmed my heart!

Q1. Why did you choose to volunteer at FISH?

A1. During a previous job, I volunteered briefly with the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia and the Eastern Shore and became aware of how vital their contributions were to the community.

After moving to Williamsburg, one of our neighbors mentioned she attended church with Cathey Sadowski who worked at an all-volunteer food pantry, and I was immediately interested in learning more about FISH. (Cathey is our long-serving FISH Secretary.) I wanted to give back to the community, and FISH provided the opportunity for a "win-win".

Q2. What do you find most rewarding about volunteering at FISH?

A2. We are very fortunate and I enjoy giving back to those who are down on their luck and need a helping hand to get back on their feet. I also really enjoy the time I spend there with the other volunteers.

Q3. Do you have a specific experience while volunteering at FISH that you would like to share?

A3. I am amazed by how appreciative our clients are. During a recent shift at the Food Pantry, we had received a donation of frozen steaks and after delivering a cart with their order, which included a nice sirloin cut, the client remarked, "Thank you. I haven't had a steak in over ten years." That made my day!

Q4. Is there anything else you would like others to know about you?

A4. My wife, Debbie, volunteers as a docent at Jamestown Settlement, and with our three kids grown and out on their own, we dote on our rescue-adopted Brittany-English Setter mix, Peyton.
