#### Another Way to Donate to FISH -- RMD

If you are in the age group where it is mandated that you take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your IRA or 401(k), you need to do this annually by December 31.

This amount can go to a non-profit organization and does not count as taxable income to you, but this does count towards your RMD distribution. It is not considered income for tax purposes.

Un-be-lievable! That's \$3,000 more than last year! And we were stunned last year!


We also had more FISH volunteers at the sale this year than ever before. Your extra help during the sale event from set up through clean up on Wednesday and Thursday was a great boost to our success!

## **VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT**

### **Serving Others**

Wilma Caban Clothes Closet - Spanish Translator



Virginia has been my home twice in my life. Since my father was in the military, I lived the first 12 years of my life in Virginia, then we moved to Puerto Rico. Many years later I moved to Indianapolis to support my daughter during a major surgery. Then in 2023, I relocated to Virginia. I was surprised that all of my English came back after speaking Spanish for so many years.

A typical day at FISH is to start work in the Clothes Closet, then the Reception volunteer calls to ask me to translate for a client. I walk to Reception, meet the clients and assist them in completing their registration form and food order request. Usually there are about 5 members in a family. I guide them in next steps, which is to pick up their food items at Door #2. Ideally, if there is not a waiting line, I take their designated family member with me to the Clothes Closet to select clothing for the family which takes about an hour. If, however, there is a waiting line, I guide them to the free clothing racks/tables outside to find items while they wait. I also advise them that they can return for clothing another day, if that's more convenient. Often there are several clients in a day who need translation services.

I'm grateful for the opportunity to volunteer at FISH because once I needed help and received it from my church and family. Therefore, I understand firsthand the importance of help in a time of need. In the past, I volunteered at a tiny church pantry in Indianapolis, at jails, and wherever needed since when we serve others, we serve God.

I also assist with the kids ministry at my church, <u>CrossWalk</u>. The church was the site of another Pop Up Food Pantry on November 15, co-sponsored by the House of Mercy and FISH. I translated there, as I did at the earlier pop-ups.

While I cherish my family (2 daughters and 3 grandchildren), I also cherish the wonderful friendships that I have made with my FISH family. Sometimes at the end of a busy day, we hug. It's beautiful to share aches, pains, and blessings with such wonderful people. I wish everyone could go through an experience like this.

Wilma has been a godsend to FISH as she translated our forms into Spanish and works tirelessly to ease the experience for our clients and non-Spanish speaking volunteers. Her sunny spirit brightens every day.
