But the parking lot was full of cars of dedicated volunteers in both the Clothes Closet (11 volunteers on one snowy day!) and the Pantry who continued their work as if it weren't snowing! We are grateful to have you. Your hard work is evident. Thanks, everyone!

The price of eggs is out of hand! FISH usually purchases 150 dozen eggs each week to give to our clients. Fortunately, two anonymous donors stepped up and purchased \$10 gift cards from Food Lion to cover our usual February cost of eggs. We truly thank them for their generosity!

Did you know that our Clothes Closet sets out racks of clothing in the back area of our parking lot every day? These clothes are welcome for our clients to take without going against their clothing allotment. This is so popular that our faithful Clothing volunteers restock this area several times a day. Our clients appreciate the extra clothes, shoes, and other items they can take with them.

FISH just received a large donation of toothbrushes and toothpaste from Norge Dental Center. This is a great addition to our hygiene corner. Thank you.


# Having Fun with a Client

# **Lindsay Lilly**

We are a military family who moved to the Williamsburg area in 2021. My neighbor, Deb Morris, told me that she loved volunteering at FISH, and that they needed additional helpers during Thanksgiving and Christmas. One day I went with her, then I kept asking her if I could go again, and again. After the holidays, I submitted a formal application and became an official volunteer.

My relationship and love of FISH has grown steadily. The first commitment was for the second Monday of every month, plus lots of subbing. Since I got up early to get my son to school, I responded to a lot of the "Request for Sub" emails that arrive from Martha Buell, our Volunteer Coordinator, about 6:00 a.m.

Now I'm honored to have been elected to serve on the Board of Directors, and my schedule has changed since I also accepted the role of Food Purchasing Coordinator. I'm at FISH on Monday, Thursday and Friday mornings. Every Monday morning, I work with the Food Delivery Team which picks up food from the Midtown Row Food Lion, delivers and shelves it at the Pantry. I check the inventory and place a Food Lion order to be picked up the following Monday. Thursday morning activity is similar but with the Trader Joe's Team; and on Fridays, Marci Kaplan-Lips, Assistant Food Coordinator, and I team up to get the Harris Teeter-Lightfoot donation. Let me add here how important the FISH van is to all our teams!

The experience of helping others and seeing the joy on their faces as they receive food and clothing is always rewarding. Additionally, the opportunity to connect with the remarkable volunteers has made my FISH experience richer.

When not at FISH, I love to read thrillers, fiction--most everything. I also volunteer at the James City County Library in the Circulation Department for a couple of hours once a week. As a family, we enjoy Busch Gardens and golfing.
